Ayyappan has said that Indian Council of Agriculture Research (ICAR) has introduced new schemes to bridge the gap between agriculture scientists and farmers and to ensure effective transfer of technologies from laboratory to land. Delivering the 34th annual convocation address of Gulbarga University at ESIC Auditorium here on Thursday, Dr. Ayyappan, who was till recently the Director of ICAR, said that one of the new schemes is called "Student READY (Rural Entrepreneurship and Awareness Development Yojana)". It is a one-year composite programme consisting of three components — experimental learning, rural awareness work experience and in-plant training — to be taken up during the last year of the undergraduate programme. 5. India is third in nanotech publications

India is only behind China and USA when it comes to nanotechnology publications, said Dr. V. Ramgopal Rao, P.K. Kelkar chair professor in the Department of Electrical Engineering and the Chief Investigator for the Centre of Excellence in nano-electronics projects at IIT Bombay.

He was speaking at the UPE Distinguished Lecture on 'Bridging R&D with Product Innovation' at the School of Life Sciences, University of Hyderabad (UoH).

He said India has been publishing research papers and patents, but ranks pretty low when it comes to producing products based on these papers. Read more

6. Generic gliptin's market grows at the expense of patented medicines

INDIA'S GLIPTIN

In their bid to get a larger share of the pie in the anti-diabetic drug market, 14 companies have launched their own teneligliptin during the last eight months. In contrast, the market growth for four other gliptins – which are patented - has plateaued. Doctors believe this generic drug may eclipse the patented ones in future.

According to the latest data of IMS Health, a global information and technology services company, those which have launched their own teneligliptin in last eight months include Glenmark, Intas, Ajanta, Eris Life Sciences, Mankind, Micro Labs, Alembic, Zydus Cadila, Unichem, Wockhardt, Corona Remedies and Macleods. 7. Measures taken by the Government for preservation of Ethnic and Tribal medicinal practices

A research council viz. Central Council for Research in Ayurvedic Sciences (CCRAS) of AYUSH ministry has been implementing a Tribal Health Care Research Programme (THCRP) which aims at collecting information on folk medicines / traditional practices prevalent in different parts of the country besides extending health care services to tribal population. Presently, the programme is being implemented through 16 peripheral institutes / units of CCRAS located in different part of the country. CCRAS through its peripheral institutes / units (viz. Itanagar - Arunachal Pradesh, Bangalore-Karnataka, Jhansi-Uttar Pradesh and Tari khet Uttarakhand) is also conducting Medico-ethno Botanical survey at different regions across the country for documenting and publishing the same from time to time. 8. WHO: Developing countries need smart IP systems for local medicines production

The WHO has released a report on the role of IP in local production of medicines in developing countries. 9. Health ministry amends D&C Rules to exempt clinical trials for academic research from DCGI nod

SOON CLINICAL TRIALS

FOR ACADEMIC

RESEARCH DO NOT NEED

PRIOR PERMISSION

FROM THE DCGI

The Union health ministry has amended the Drugs and Cosmetics Rules, 1945 for providing exemption in the case of clinical trials undertaken in the medical institutions or hospitals for academic research. Once the amendment is done, these institutions and hospitals do not have to take the now mandatory prior permission from the Drugs Controller General of India (DCGI).

"No permission for conduct of clinical trial intended for academic purposes in respect of approved drug formulation shall be required for any new indication or new route of administration or new dose or new dosage form where, (a) the trial is approved by the Ethics Committee; and (b) subject to the provisions of sub-rule 5, the data generated is not intended for submission to licensing authority. 10. National IPR policy to be out shortly

India's Intellectual Property Right (IPR) policy will be out soon and the government hopes to bring more people under the umbrella of copyrights, a senior official said today.

"It (IPR policy) should be out in the next few days," Rajiv Aggarwal, Joint Secretary in the Department of Industrial Policy and Promotion (DIPP), said at a Ficci event.

Several countries and multinational corporations want India to bring its patent laws at par with global standards. Under the Ministry of Commerce and Industry, DIPP (Department of Industrial Policy and Promotion) had prepared and circulated the draft IPR policy and invited public comments last year. Read more

New Delhi, Apr 1 (KNN) The area of copyright has shifted to DIPP which will be the nodal department to deal with all issues related to copyright in the country, said Rajiv Aggarwal, Joint Secretary, Department of Industrial Policy & Promotion (DIPP), Ministry of Commerce and Industry. He said this while addressing a seminar on 'Managing Copyright in Publishing' organized by FICCI, DIPP and World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO). The programme aimed to highlight the key issues of piracy and counterfeit in publishing.

Delivering the keynote address, Francis Gurry, Director General, WIPO emphasised that in the last 20 years, copyright has moved from the periphery to the centre of the economic systems. Read more
